FINDING OUR NICHE

Someone recently reminded me that McDonalds is known for its hamburgers and fries, Chick-fil-A for its chicken nuggets and waffle fries, and Arby's for its roast beef and curly fries. None of them try to be like the other. They know who they are and it guides everything they do.

When we forget who we are, we wander aimlessly grabbing for anything. The pressure to be like other churches (especially the ones with many participants) which is always present, grows even stronger.

When we look at who God has brought together in this congregation and the uniqueness of this group, we discover an identity as family. Many will tell you that the relationships they have formed here have been as deep and sustaining as the ones with their biological family, sometimes even more meaningful. Sitting around our table is the unconditional love and wisdom of a grandparent, the shaping influence of a parent, the adventuresome spirit of youth who believe anything is possible, the inquisitiveness of children who see the world through the lens of innocence, the loyalty of best friend, and empty chairs reserved for additional family members we have yet to meet.

With identity comes our mission. For us, it is to help people to become fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ. We introduce people to Jesus Christ and walk together as we all become like him.

So, now where is God taking us? I have shared on several occasions my sense that God is leading us to be bridge builders, extending a hand to people on the other side who may be very different from ourselves. One of those gaps is generational. As we seek to be stronger in our intergenerational relationships, it means we need to know and understand one another, how we think and make decisions, what we value, how we view the world, and how we relate to God. It is a two-way street as we connect with those who are older or younger than ourselves.

This year we are going to be asking four questions of ourselves. Is this a place where:

- · Radical hospitality is practiced in such a way that people know they are welcome just as they are?
- · Fearless conversations are entered with all thoughts, doubts, and questions welcome?
- Genuine humility is displayed as we put Jesus Christ and others first?
- Anticipating God's presence and power daily leads to connecting with him in fresh ways?

Early in 2017, we have several opportunities to build bridges across generational gaps. On Wednesday evenings in January, we are launching conversations based loosely on Adam Hamilton's book, "When Christians Get It Wrong."

We want to understand what the church has done

to alienate young adults from the church. A quick preview of a few of the things to come: Jessica Stollings, President of ReGenerations, will present a one-day session in the spring to help us understand generational differences; a multi-generational mission experience in June is planned to assist families who lost their homes in the Gatlinburg fire; and the people leading aspects of our worship experiences will reflect the diversity of our church family.

A congregation like this is not for everybody, yet everyone is welcome. We are looking for people who are being led by God to be part of such a congregation, people who will invest, sacrifice, grow, and learn.
